Indira Gandhi, former prime minister of India, said, "The desire for peace is universal."¹ Perhaps the desire is strong because the condition is rare.

A cynic once said, "Peace is the brief glorious moment in history when everybody stands around reloading." In the last 3,000 years, the world has been at peace a total of 286 years (eight percent of the time). In 14,531 wars, 3,640,000,000 people have been killed. More than 8,000 treaties have been broken.²

What is true on the world stage is also true in individual hearts. In fact, wars in the heart produce wars in families, nations, and churches. If we can fix enough hearts, then we may fix the world.

Christianity is the peaceful religion (Isaiah 2:4; Matthew 5:9). Some have sullied its name with violence, but they did not represent the Prince of Peace any more than the "Indians" of the Boston Tea Party represented the native peoples of America.

How does the Bible picture the peace Jesus gives?

CHRISTIANS ARE SHEEP IN THE SHEPHERD'S HAND

Jesus said, "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand. My Father, who has given them to Me, is greater than all; and no one is able to snatch them out of My Father's hand" (John 10:27-29; cf. Isaiah 49:2).

In every generation, evil men mistreat, abuse, and persecute good people (2 Timothy 3:8, 13). God protects Christians in answer to their prayers (Matthew 6:13; cf. Acts 26:17-18; 2 Timothy 4:17), although at times He allows their faith to be tested (1 Corinthians 3:12-15). Evil men cannot ultimately harm God's child. Jesus said, "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. But rather fear Him who is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matthew 10:28).

A challenge to shepherds is the sheep's tendency to wander off. Few shepherds could say they have never lost a sheep to terrain, beasts, elements, or thieves. Jesus

can. He will never lose us in the uneven terrain of eventful lives, to the beasts of persecution, to the elements of cold hearts and hot passion, or to the devil's thieving hands. We may forsake Him (1 Timothy 5:12; Galatians 5:4), and lose ourselves (2 Peter 2:20–22), but He will never forsake us (John 10:1–10; 17:11–12).

This promise grants tremendous peace to Christians in an evil generation (Acts 2:40). Paul asked, “Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?” (Romans 8:35). The answer is no one. Families cannot. Friends cannot. Strangers cannot. Enemies cannot. Satan cannot.

Jesus was a carpenter (Matthew 13:55; Mark 6:3), and carpenters have strong hands. Swinging a hammer, carrying lumber, sawing boards, and laying blocks build strength. His hands no longer do physical work, but the devil's claws are no match for their spiritual strength.

Christians can say with confidence, “I am on my way to heaven” (2 Timothy 1:12; 1 John 2:3, 5; 4:13; 5:4, 14). While John 10:28 is not a promise to everybody (it is for sheep) or even every Christian (only those who hear and follow), it is for every faithful Christian.

Paul said, “I have kept the faith. Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing” (2 Timothy 4:7–8). By God's grace (Isaiah 40:31) and through His strength (Philippians 4:13), we can make it to heaven (Matthew 25:23). Knowing this brings peace that money cannot buy.

CHRISTIANS ARE APPLE TREES IN THE WOODS

Applying a figure from Solomon's song to Christ's bride, the church, paints a com-

forting picture. It says, “Like an apple tree among the trees of the woods, so is my beloved among the sons” (Song of Solomon 2:3). An apple tree in a wooded area is overshadowed by taller trees that absorb moisture and sunlight. Yet because it is an apple tree, the owner pays attention to it, cultivates it, and cherishes it above other trees. It will not be neglected nor allowed to wither.

Christians in society are like apple trees in wooded areas. They might seem non-descript among the rich in the community, the talented at work, the powerful in government, the intelligent in school, and the popular at parties, yet God knows their names (Luke 10:20; 2 Timothy 2:19), hears their prayers (1 Peter 3:12), watches over them (Matthew 28:20; Hebrews 13:5), and makes life better for them (John 10:10; Philippians 4:19; James 1:17). They are fruitful—producing what He cherishes (John 15:1–8). Soon their God will publicly praise them (1 Corinthians 4:5).

CHRISTIANS ARE CHICKS UNDER CHRIST'S WINGS

Jesus wanted to gather Jerusalem's citizens together, “as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings” (Matthew 23:37). Although they would not, Christians have gathered under those wings. Psalm 91:4 says, “He shall cover you with His feathers, and under His wings you shall take refuge; His truth shall be your shield and buckler.”

Christians are “preserved in Jesus Christ” (Jude 1:1) “for His heavenly kingdom” (2 Timothy 4:18). Wood that is preserved lasts while untreated lumber rots; fruits that are preserved are still good long after fresh fruit is gone.

Jesus the High Priest saves “to the uttermost” them that come to God by Him

(Hebrews 7:25). Jesus the Advocate will present Christians faultless at judgment “with exceeding joy” (Jude 1:24). Jesus the King will say to those on the right, “Come, you blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world” (Matthew 25:34). Knowing this lets the peace of God rule in our hearts (Colossians 3:15).

CHRISTIANS ARE RESIDENTS OF GOD'S CITY OF REFUGE

In ancient Israel, God designated six cities, three on each side of the Jordan River, as cities of refuge.

Manslayers rushed to them for protection from avengers of blood (near kinsmen with authority to take life for life) (cf. Genesis 9:6; Exodus 21:23; Leviticus 24:17). If a manslayer stayed there, he was protected. If he left, he could be killed (Numbers 35:26–28; Joshua 20:1–9).

Humanity's avenger of death is Satan (John 8:44; Revelation 12:9). He prowls, looking to devour (1 Peter 5:8). The whole world is guilty of manslaughter, for man's sins killed Jesus (Hebrews 6:6). Though we did not personally participate, we have personally sinned, so we are culpable (Romans 3:23; 6:23). If we continue wandering in sin, eventually death will catch us, and we will fall into the avenger's hands (2 Thessalonians 2:9–12).

The church is God's city of refuge. It is a sanctuary from condemnation (Romans 8:1). Those who have fled to Jesus for protection have found strong consolation (Hebrews 6:17–19). He is a “refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble” (Psalm 46:1, 7, 11; 62:7–8; Proverbs 14:26; 18:10; John 15:4–5).

Satan cannot get to those in the city, so he tries to lure them out (James 1:13–15). The New Testament epistles were primarily written to exhort Christians to remain in the city—faithful to Christ in the church (1 Corinthians 9:27; 15:58; Hebrews 3:14; 2 Peter 1:5–11; Revelation 2:10; 22:14). If we do, Satan cannot condemn us (Romans 5:1–2).

CHRISTIANS ARE TRAVELERS IN THE CLEFT OF THE ROCK

One caught in the wilderness by a sudden, violent storm looks for a rocky over-

hang or a shallow cave to protect from lightning, wind, and rain.

Every life faces storms—health problems, family issues, financial crises, loss, tragedy, death, depression, or hardship. Storms come with living in a fallen world among sinful people.

When Moses faced a storm, God said, “I will put you in the cleft of the rock” (Exodus 33:22). He does this for His children today. Songs celebrate this truth. Augustus Toplady wrote (1776), “Rock of Ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in thee.”³ Cleland McAfee wrote (1903), “There is a place of quiet rest, near to the heart of God; a place where sin cannot molest, near to the heart of God.”⁴

David said, “The Lord is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer; my God, my strength, in whom I will trust; my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold” (Psalm 18:2). “The beloved of the Lord shall dwell in safety by Him, who shelters him all the day long” (Deuteronomy 33:12).

CHRISTIANS ARE MEMBERS IN CHRIST'S BODY

In Jesus, His disciples have peace and can be of good cheer (John 16:33).

God's blessings have often been restricted to locations:

- The tree of life was in the Garden of Eden. When Adam and Eve were driven from Eden, they had no access to the tree's blessings (Genesis 3:24).
- Salvation from the flood was in the ark. All outside perished (Genesis 6–9).
- When firstborn children in Egypt faced the plague of death, safety was in houses where the Passover lamb's blood was sprinkled on door posts (Exodus 12).
- Rahab was saved in the house with the scarlet cord (Joshua 2; 6:25).
- Paul said in a storm: “Unless these men stay in the ship, you cannot be saved” (Acts 27:31).

Peace, prosperity, and safety are where God placed them—in the church (Ephesians 1:3; 3:21; cf. Psalm 122:7). Being in Christ is synonymous with being a member of His church (Galatians 3:26–27; Ephesians 1:22–23; 4:4). Some of the blessings found in Christ (a phrase Paul

used 169 times) include the following:

- Redemption (Romans 3:24; Colossians 1:14)
- Peace (Romans 5:1)
- Joy (Romans 5:11)
- Grace (Romans 5:17)
- Abundant life (Romans 6:11; John 10:10).
- Eternal life (Romans 6:22; Ephesians 1:3–13; 1 John 5:11)
- Newness of life (Romans 6:4)
- Forgiveness (Ephesians 1:7)
- Salvation (2 Timothy 2:10; Acts 4:12; John 14:6).

Since all spiritual blessings are in Christ (Ephesians 1:3) and none are outside, to have them one must be in the church.

How does one get into Christ? Only three Scriptures answer that question, and they all say the same thing—one is baptized into Christ (Galatians 3:27; Romans 6:3; 1 Corinthians 12:13).

One is brought **to** Christ by hearing the gospel (Romans 10:13–14); believing it (Hebrews 11:6); repenting of sins (Acts 17:30; Luke 13:3); and confessing Christ (Matthew 10:32–33; Romans 10:10). One is brought **into** Christ by baptism.

Is there a storm in your heart that Jesus can calm?

Ask the Children

Who said, "A bad marriage is better than a good divorce?" Probably a preacher, you say? Perhaps a well-meaning father or mother-in-law? My guess is a person verbalizing a view of divorce's innocent victims—the children.

In a 15-year study of 60 mostly middle class families including 131 children from 2 to 18 years, psychologist Judith Wallerstein found that a large number of children continue to suffer for the sins of their parents for years after a divorce. In her book, *Second Chances*, Wallerstein reports the following:

Three of five children feel rejected by one or both parents.

One-half grew up with parents continuing to war with each other.

Two-thirds of the girls, many of whom reacted calmly during the divorce, suddenly became deeply anxious as young adults, unable to make lasting commitments out of fear of betrayal.

Many boys, overtly troubled in post-divorce years, failed to develop a sense of self-confidence, purpose, or independence. They drifted in and out of college and from job to job.

In an article in *Pediatrics*, Dr. Max Sugar of LSU Medical School noted that divorce often leaves children with a bit-

tersweet legacy of an enduring "Magic Wish" for the parents' reconciliation. Many children unconsciously maneuver parents into reunions, especially during holidays, from this undying desire.

Godliness is sharing God's values and viewpoints and carrying them out in our lives. In one of Scripture's strongest statements, God says that He "hates divorce" (Malachi 2:16). All children hate divorce, as all of God's children should.

In a *Newsweek* article, Susan Jordan wrote, "I think people should be upset about divorce . . . I'm grown up; I have responsibilities; I am in the middle of a life-long marriage, hanging in there, sometimes enduring, sometimes enjoying. For some reason we make no such assumption about staying on the job, keeping the same religion, voting the same ticket."

Many good things can be said about "hanging in there" in marriage; nothing good can be said of divorce. Though at first it may appear a panacea, it is more often a Pandora's Box of insoluble problems that plague parents and children.

So is a bad marriage better than a good divorce? It depends on whom you ask. If seriously seeking the answer, do not forget to ask your Father, His children, and your own. —Shawn Jones

Dangerous “Nations” among Us

In the history of the world, many nations have posed great danger to people who lived around them. In ancient times, Egypt, Assyria, Chaldea, Rome, and others were dangerous. In recent history, Germany, Japan, Russia, and China have been seen as dangerous.

However, the most dangerous “nations” are not earthly powers. They are spiritual forces.

1. Some things are **abomi-nations** to God, for they pervert and destroy man spiritually. In Deuteronomy 18:9–12, Moses taught that idolatry and many practices of the occult were abominations. Solomon said seven things are an abomination to God: a proud look, a lying tongue, hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet swift to run to evil, a false witness, and one who sows discord among brethren (Proverbs 6:16–19).

2. Many Christians are eternally ruined by **contami-nation**. They fall prey to worldliness—immorality, drinking,

dancing, cursing, and gambling, for instance. They become spotted by the world (James 1:27).

3. **Discrimination** is a great danger to world peace and well-being. All people are made in the image of God (Genesis 1:26–27); in Christ all are of equal importance and value to God (Galatians 3:28). Why do some practice discrimination between rich and poor, young and old, male and female, black and white?

4. Some are defeated by **termination**. It may be that one becomes unhappy or upset with something in the local church such as family problems, disagreements among brethren, or hurting someone's feelings. What happens? They terminate—give up church responsibilities, stop contributing, and quit attending. In the end, they become entangled and overcome by the defilements of the world (2 Peter 2:20–22).

5. As innocent as it looks, **procrastination** is a dangerous nation. One may

convince himself that he means well and will do better some day while completely dominated by this “nation.”

6. **Denominations** are dangerous because, while appearing beneficial, they divide believers in Christ into separate competing groups. Christ came to unite all in one body (John 17:20; Ephesians 4:4), the undenominational church of Christ (Romans 16:16).

Paul taught against this “nation,” saying there should be “no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment” (1 Corinthians 1:10).

The ultimate danger to our souls is eternal **CONDEMNATION**. One day all will stand before God in judgment to receive eternal victory over these dangerous “nations,” or to be condemned because of them. —Darrell E. Beard

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

Were Jesus' Resurrection Appearances Hallucinations?

Hallucinations are uncommon and only happen under unusual circumstances. Hallucinations are:

- Individual-based. More than 500 saw Jesus at once (1 Corinthians 15:6). Could 500 people be fooled at one time? This many could not have been predisposed to see visions.
- Experienced only by certain kinds of people—those highly strung, imaginative, nervous. Hallucinations are most common among paranoid schizophrenics. Do the apostles—fishermen, tax collector, scholar—strike you this way? The disciples were not credulous, excitable persons but men who were reluctant to believe even after seeing the empty tomb.
- Linked to past experience. The opposite happened regarding Jesus' resurrection. The witnesses were not reenacting previous experiences with Jesus.
- Restricted as to when and where they can occur (associated with nostalgia and familiar surroundings). Several persons, at different times, in various moods, and in different places saw Jesus.
- Have an atmosphere of anticipation or hope. Jesus was recognized not by persons who expected to see Him alive, but by women who went to anoint His dead body. His apostles thought the women's report was like idle tales (Luke 24:11). Thomas flatly stated, "Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25). Every person to whom He appeared was taken by surprise.
- Long-term. The appearances of Jesus stopped as suddenly as they started, 40 days after the resurrection.

WHY STRESS THE IMPORTANCE OF BAPTISM?

The jailor's question, "What must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:30) is still on the minds of thinking individuals. According to the Bible, the answer begins with hearing the gospel of Christ (Romans 10:17) and believing in Jesus as God's Son (Acts 16:30–34; John 8:24). Next, one must repent of sins (Acts 17:30–31;

Luke 13:3; Acts 2:38) and confess faith that Jesus is the Christ (Romans 10:9–10; Matthew 10:32–33; Acts 8:37). Then consummating act of one's obedience is baptism to be saved (Mark 16:15–16).

A question often arises: "Why stress the baptism so much?" These answer Bible references give the answer:

- Water stands between the sinner and cleansing (Ephesians 5:26).
Water stands between the sinner and sanctification (Ephesians 5:26).
Water stands between the sinner ... and putting away sins (Colossians 2:11–13).
Water stands between the sinner and new life in Christ (Ephesians 2:6).
Water stands between the sinner and living with Christ (Ephesians 2:5).
Water stands between the sinner and forgiveness (Colossians 1:13–14).
Water stands between the sinner and the kingdom (John 3:5).
Water stands between the sinner and the blood of Christ (John 19:34).
Water stands between the sinner and a good conscience (1 Peter 3:21).
Water stands between the sinner ... and the promise through Christ (Acts 2:39).
Water stands between the sinner and the body (1 Corinthians 12:12).
Water stands between the sinner and salvation (1 Peter 3:21).
Water stands between the sinner and sonship (Galatians 3:26–27).

The Most Wonderful Time of the Year

Depending on who you ask, people have different "favorite" times of the year. Most people will associate the title of this article with the season surrounding Christmas. For some, the fall season with its changing colors and pumpkin spice is their favorite time. During my high school days, we had a teacher who kept a decorated tree in her room. While it is natural to see a decorated tree for Christmas, she decorated it for every season and every holiday. To her, every season was the most wonderful time of the year.

We should be able to find good in every month, every season, and every day. God created everything that we experience in this life. When He "saw everything He had made," He said "it was very good" (Genesis 1:31 NKJV). James wrote that "every good gift and every perfect gift is from above" (James 1:17). If God said everything He made is good, and everything good comes from God, then should we not see all that God has made as good? God has blessed us with beautiful and wonderful life. We ought to be thankful for the variety He has given to us.

Though the world around us is thriving and beautiful, many living in it are dying spiritually. Much of the spiritual decay is due to a lack of gratitude for what God has given. Paul wrote that the people who reject God are without excuse because they did not glorify Him as God, and they were not thankful (Romans 1:20-21). He wrote to a young preacher to stay away from unthankful people (2 Timothy 3:2). When we do not give thanks to God for what He has given us, we will stray further from Him.

If we want to come closer to God, we can begin by understanding what God has done for us and be thankful. Paul wrote that being filled with the spirit included giving thanks to God (Ephesians 5:18-20). He also encouraged his readers to rejoice always and be thankful for everything (1 Thessalonians 5:18). Giving thanks is part of our continual sacrifice to God, the fruit of our lips (Hebrews 13:15). If we want to have a true, spiritual life, we must be thankful.

There is a hymn we sing called, "Count Your Blessings." Does it not make sense for us to count the blessings God has given us in this life? Let's learn to be ever thankful for every time of the year, especially this time of the year (whenever you are reading this) because God has given it to us. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).
